



# 2023 Year in Review: Alumni Achievement

Scott Parlett - New College (NC) 2006-2010. New Collegian of the Year 2007, Sports Director 2008, and New College Postgraduate Village (NCPV) 2012-2016. Senior Resident 2013-2014

In July 2023, with over 18 years of extensive knowledge, experience and qualifications in working in the higher education sector. Scott started his new journey as the Director of Nura Gili, Centre for Indigenous Programs. Nura Gili is the UNSW student-facing program dedicated to recruiting and supporting Indigenous students in their studies at UNSW.

Reflecting on nearly a decade spent living on campus at UNSW, he cherishes the diverse experiences and lifelong friendships forged during his time here. Transitioning from a shy country kid to a confident individual, Scott believes UNSW and New College Communities empowered him to find his voice through academic pursuits, sports, and campus involvement.

Before assuming his current role, Scott served as School Manager and Lecturer, Indigenous Strategies in Design, School of Design at Queensland University of Technology. He specialises in teaching contemporary Indigenous design perspectives, fostering cultural awareness dialogues among staff, and addressing hidden barriers in learning, teaching, research, and community engagement.

His time at UNSW and Colleges wasn't just focused around sports and socials. The opportunities the Colleges provided

to volunteer and make a change were impactful for him, and he credits their support as the driving force behind his decision to apply to become Director of Nura Gili.

As Director, he is dedicated to collaborating with the leadership team to create a place of cultural inclusion and safety for Indigenous students, as well as a deep sense of belonging and connection to Indigenous communities that is built upon respect for all. He endeavours to develop aspirational programs and unique pathways that go beyond conventional norms, encouraging innovative thinking, addressing real-world challenges, and shaping future leaders. The programs he creates at Nura Gili facilitate full connection to culture, hands-on learning experiences, and extend beyond the standard classrooms.

New College (and New College Postgraduate Village) is more than a residential college. It's home away from home. It's family and lifelong friendships! Reflecting on all the opportunities and doorways the university and college provided me has guided me to where I am today.

In September 2023, alumnus Dr Greg Clarke was appointed as the CEO of The Leprosy Mission Australia. Greg has been grateful for his opportunities at New College to engage in creative, educational, and philanthropic endeavours, which have then been his primary motivations throughout his career.

Greg has held various other leadership positions in academic and intellectual institutions such as the Centre for Public Christianity and the Macquarie Christian Studies Institute, gaining experience in both educational and business management domains. During the pandemic, he served as CEO of the Australian Institute of Music, drawing upon his background to lead the institution through the difficult COVID period.

His tenure as CEO of Bible Society Australia was particularly fulfilling as he realised that his sweet spot as a leader is developing strategy to morph established institutions into a better shape for flourishing today. He finds satisfaction in problem-solving, improving people's situation in life and making valuable contributions, viewing his impact on others as a privilege and a meaningful aspect of his work.

"I felt honoured to have another opportunity (after Bible Society) to lead a venerable Christian organisation with a clear understanding of its role. Within our lifetime, leprosy will be eliminated from the world after 4000 years of terror and suffering. That's an amazing moment at which to become part of the story!"


# **Financial Management**

Our approach to financial management has been developed over 55 years and especially the last 20 as we have significantly expanded our operations.

Our overall objective is to ensure that our key stakeholders (students, their families, financial supporters, UNSW) all receive best value for their investment. Our approach is founded on three pillars:

- 1. Rigour in all of our accounting practices.
- 2. Transparency in all of our undertakings with our suppliers and clients.
- 3. A community ownership approach to the management of our services and facilities.

At the heart of this is a Christian concern for the most vulnerable. Amongst our supporters are generous donors towards a developing scholarship program. Also, by gently dealing with people in times of financial difficulty, dishonour of contract financial obligations have continued to remain at a remarkably low level. Partnership with our financial supporters during COVID yielded remarkable financial performance and subsequent recovery.


